As part of the Generation Equality Forum, Data2X: Assessed the GEF Global Acceleration plan (https://data2x.org/resource-center/gef-data-priority/), authored the gender data spotlight section of the plan, and called on all stakeholders to make meaningful and measurable gender data commitments to accelerate global gender equality (https://data2x.org/resource-center/gef-commitment-guidance/) Made our own commitment (https://data2x.org/progress-is-not-progress-if-it-leaves-people-behind-data2xs-commitment-to-gender-data-for-the-generation-equality-forum/) to

in support of GEF to cultivate accountability, knowledge-sharing, and solutions for advancing gender data, and launched an accompanying microsite (https://data2x.org/commit/). 2. Data2X published the first-ever in-depth analysis of the financing gap for gender data (https://data2x.org/resource-center/state-of-gender-data-financing-2021/):
 Putting a number to the problem, articulating what the gender data system covers, the magnitude of the funding shortfall, and what is needed from donors and countries to close the gap. These studies have been used and referenced by several organizations advocating for gender equality. The Bern Network, a coalition of donors focused financing for development data, identified gender
data financing as one of their priorities based on this work and advocacy around the topic by Data2X. The flagship product of the Bern Network is a Clearinghouse bringing together for the first time a wealth of information and advocacy material on development data financing with a special Gender Data Channel (https://smartdatafinance.org/gender) supported by Data2X.
3. The US government released its historic National Strategy on Gender Equity and Equality, which includes a government-wide effort to close gender data gaps and strengthen data collection and analysis across agencies: • This is a major achievement for gender data advocacy Data2X and partners have done over the years, and as such, the Data2X team mobilized quickly to analyze

the Strategy, including a statement immediately following its publication (https://data2x.org/gender-data-takes-center-stage-in-historic-national-gender-strategy/), and a policy brief: Gender Data to Achieve U.S. Objectives: Evaluating the United States' National Strategy on Gender Equity and Equality (https://data2x.org/resource-center/gender-data-to-achieve-u-s-policy-objectives-evaluating-the-united-states-national-strategy-on-gender-equity-and-equality/)
Additional highlights include: Data2X has continued to track the landscape of gender data, while also looking beyond the gaps to identifying promising solutions. Building on our pioneering work on big data and gender, we surveyed the big data space to assess recent progress, review innovative studies, and draw out six global observations and trends to guide big data & gender opportunities moving forward (https://data2x.org/resource-center/the-landscape-of-big-data-and-gender-a-data2x-update/) We also continued our landscaping on data availability for the SDGs; Data2X published the third regional Bridging the Gap report on Asia and the Pacific (https://data2x.org/resource-center/bridging-the-gap-asia-key-findings-and-recommendations/), completing an assessment of gender data availability in 25 countries worldwide. We also began work on mapping solutions to key

ways to increase and use gender data to inform COVID-19 response (https://data2x.org/resource-center/solutions-for-building-resilient-gender-data-systems/). • The Africa Gender Data Network, which we founded in collaboration with the UN Economic Commission for Africa, became the Gender Data Network in 2021. The secretariat was moved to PARIS21 (housed in the OECD) as the first step to expansion to new regions in 2022. • Following on our partnership with ILO to more fully and accurately measure women's work and contributions to economies, Data2X published a case series examining the direct policy impact of this new approach to measurement (https://data2x.org/resource-center/fulfilling-the-promise-of-better-data-on-gender-and-work/).
